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EXECUTIVE SUMMERY

The Year 1969 marks the beginning of college education in this area. With inspiration of Shri Rameshwar Prasad Sharma, Chairman, Laxamaneshwar Shikshan Samiti, Kharod and great efforts by Prof. Ram Narayan Shukla a night college in Bilaspur could be established. This college was affiliated to Ravi Shankar Vishwavidyalaya, Raipur in 1969-1970 and the College Education Department of M.P. Government also accorded its recognition. The college was inaugurated on September 11, 1969 by then Vice Chancellor of Ravi Shankar University, Shri Banshi Lal Pandey, I.A.S.

Later as the result of strong demand by students, day teaching began in July-August 1970. Ravi Shankar University, Raipur accorded permission to change the name of night College and the College was called degree college, Bilaspur. A few years later - i.e. in July 1982 the College was named as D.P. Vipra College after the name of the eminent literary figure Pt. Dwarika Prasad Tiwari 'Vipra', ex-president of the college Management committee. D.P. Vipra College has become a centre of attraction for the enlightened students who have, great zeal and thirst for knowledge. Teaching in all subjects is being done by able, experienced, skill and learned professors.

Post Graduate classes in many subjects were introduced in various subjects: - Sociology (1982) Hindi, Political Science and History (1984) and Economics, Geography and Psychology (1989). The faculty of commerce started in 1985. The Science faculty started in July 1991 In 1993 computer course and in 1995 B.Sc. Microbiology and Electronics were introduced. In the year 1998, Post Graduation classes in English Literature started. In the year 1999, B.Sc computer Maintenance and M.Sc. Maths started, and in the year 2001 post Graduate classes in Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Computer and Micro-Biology started. Teaching in B.Com. Computer Application, M.Sc. Electronics, B.C.A., P.G.D.C.A. began in 2004. It needs special mention that in



the session 2008-09, teaching of Bio-chemistry and Bio-technology at degree level also started.

We feel proud in saying that the State Govt. readily agreed to give this college maintenance grant since the second year of the college coming into existence. We aim at the fulfillment of several plans. It is not a matter of surprise that the college has prospered in a very short time because the Institution which aims at cultivating human virtues and works for the spread of education and preparing good citizens grow quickly. The progress can be discerned by the growing number of students. From 107 students in the beginning the number rose to 2400 in 1986-87. In the year 1994-95 the college strength was 2600 which became 3600 in 1997-98 and 4021 in 1999-2000. Since then the number is steadily increasing and it rose to 4210 in 2014-15.

The above facts show that the college has earned reputation and popularity in the field of higher Education. We aim to retain our prestige and popularity and strive to further develop the Institution qualitywise we intend to start in near future B.Sc. IT., B.Sc. Wild-life, B.Sc. Fashion Technology, M.A. in Public Administration and M.Phil in Geography. Some departments are recognised research centres of the University.

The College has earned a name in academic, curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Besides having a big, well establised central library Departments of Science have their Departmental Libraries.

We have two units of **NSS** and one unit of **Red Cross** which confirms commitment of the college towards social services. Likewise college has NCC unit of two platoons having strength of 107. NCC plays a vital role in shaping the personality of the students by teaching them discipline, societal service & self-help. Sports Dept. of the college is very active and always ensures enough space in media on students' achievement at state and national level. Dr. S.K. Tiwari, Head, Dept. of English has been publishing & editing two research journals of repute since 2006.



Inorder to maintain low carbon emission college encourages carpooling and use of public transport among the staff. Students and staff are also requested to use bicycles at least once in a week for healthy enviornment.

The Students'Union, along with various societies, organizes *Scinex* the annual festival which is one of the most popular students'festivals in the Bilaspur University. Spread over three days in October/November, the festival invites participation from all the classes of the institution. Apart from providing a spirit of togetherness, it also tests organizational skills of the students, thus extending classroom education to the practical application. The Union is instrumental in organizing the Annual Programme of the college.

The College cultivates a keen spirit of interest in sports and actively cultures energetic participation in a multitude of indoor and outdoor sports. Endorsed by its laurels and achievements of the students in sports, the College aims to deliver its mission to facilitate sports as a vital component in the healthy growth process of collegiate education.

The teaching staff of the college is highly qualified and always engaged in teaching, academic and research activities. Recently the college organized one workshop of internationally recognized scholar Dr. Wajuppa Tossa, an associate professor in the University of Mahasarakham University, Thailand.

The Principal along with the staff with their vast experience and broad vision, support the dynamicism and ambitious plan of Shri Anurag Shukla, Chairman of governing body, to take the institute to great heights.

The various departments of the college organize educational tours, interaction with eminent personalities to fulfill the aspirations of the students to create simulative atmosphere. The faculty members of the Department through members of Board of Studies try to incorporate the suggestions for enrichment of the curriculum. The Alumni also plays an important role by giving suggestions on various issues.

The feedback committee reported that a large number of First year science students coming from rural area are absent from classes due to not understanding subject in mixed Hindi/English medium. Immediately a remedial English language coaching for ten days to these students was organized and the problem was resolved.

Like wise there was hearing problems for classes being run in auditorium, to resolve this microphone was purchased immediately.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The college gives 3% reservation to differently abled students as per rules. Social organizations and individuals are also involved in the process of assisting such students. Faculty members generously extend their help by teaching and counselling in extra time, providing books from book bank and personal collections and assistance towards financial requirement.

A Separate ramp has been constructed for differently abled students to enter the college. Normaly their classes are organized on the ground floor.

Yes, the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme Before the commencement of the program a counseling session is held by the faculty members to make the students aware of their strength and weaknesses. Awareness programs equip them regarding their goals and objectives, code of conduct, attendance requirements, curriculum structure, evaluation pattern etc.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Addon/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

To bridge the knowledge gape remedial classes are held by the faculty during the free hours to assist the weaker students coming from rural background. Special coaching is given to understand topics in English.

College sensitize its staff and students through Circulars and information sought from various government departments such as women welfare, health department, Police Department and & NGOs and the information is made available to the stake holders. Frequent lectures by experts are held for the staff and students to sensitize them over such issues.

The institution identifies and responds to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners through Unit Test, Class room interaction, group discussions, paper presentations and various extracurricular activities to motivate them to reach higher centers of learning and to achieve excellence.

How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

To avoid risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.) regular monitoring of the students attendance record, Teachers Diary is done. The respective Heads of the Departments help to identify the commitment of the students. The guardians are intimated about the attendance of their wards to enhance their commitment towards studies. The level of learning is assessed through monthly unit tests. Special attention is given to the students coming from disadvantaged section of society, physically challenged slow learners and from economically weaker sections.



2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

To organize teaching the College strictly follows the academic calendar issued by Dept. of Higher Education and Bilaspur University. The teaching plan is designed and executed in the guidance of Principal. The Course work is allotted unit wise to faculty members. Regular evaluation of the students through unit tests is an integral part of the teaching program. The Head of the institution reviews the daily Teachers diaries maintained by faculty members.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

To improve the teaching – learning process the IQAC contributes by receiving feed back through various committees, faculty members and through feedback format from students. The information is processed further for improvement.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

To make learning more student-centric the college tries to inculcate 'a passion for learning'. An interactive and collaborative approach is made to enhance the learning environment of the institution. Various extracurricular activities are conducted to sharpen the skills of the students. Educational tours and projects are a part of the enrichment program to promote independent learning among the students.



2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into lifelong learners and innovators?

To promote critical thinking among students college management have formed "Departmental Society" such as "Physics Society", "Botany Society" in every departments.

Senior and active students of PG/UG classes every year are nominated as President, Secretary, Vice-President Etc.under the supervision of faculty members. Lectures of eminent scholars, Professors, visit to learning places are organised. Members of society organize, group discussions, debates, paper presentations, seminars, lectures and quiz competition themselves.

Special programs are conducted to develop analytical ability, high self- esteem, scientific temper and decision making.

To explore the creativity we have a College magazine "Jyoti" which is inclusive of literary, social, scientific and cultural expression of the students as well as the faculty. The objective of these programs is to use knowledge as a tool and to create a globalised vision among student.

- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.
 - Our faculty members usually use classical teaching aids like black board and ceramic white board with chalk and talk method. Besides this charts, illustrations coupled with audio

 – visual aids are also used at the time of need.



- The college has provided laboratory facilities for science faculty to ensure effective learning for students.
- Some depts. use multimedia projector with Laptop to display Educational CD's which are purchased by UGC grants. A proposal for e-classroom/Smart Class and e-library is in pipeline.

For this various measures are being taken. The students and faculty members are exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills through a hybrid system i.e. blending of traditional and modern methods of learning. Sympathy, ethics and moral values go hand in hand with modern tools of access to information. Student and faculty members are motivated to pursue research work and to publish their findings on the frontiers of human knowledge in reputed journals. Organizing and participation in national and international conferences, workshops, seminars and symposium help to expose the participants to higher level of learning and thinking.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

Regarding guidance services the College has a Career Development guidance cell which deals not only with career options but also lends psycho-social guidance. The faculty members mentor potential students to achieve their goals. The alumni, social workers and NGOs are involved in providing necessary assistance to the students for their betterment.

The following innovative practices have been implemented towards quality sustenance and enhancement:

During the preparation leave, faculty is involved in dealing with students needing extra care and coaching.

After annual result, university has provision of revaluation and recounting for students of the college. As per schedule of academic calendar of university, unit tests and sessional tests are conducted every year.

Heads of various departments in the supervision of Principal with the co-opration of various committees ensure the implementation of evaluation reforms.

On review of Unit Test results it is observed that few of the first year students coming from schools complained about the shortness of time during the uint test. They were taught time managment and their probleme was solved.
